

# From Paralysis to Belief

John 5:1-17

#### John 5:2-4 (English Standard Version)

<sup>2</sup>Now there is in Jerusalem by the Sheep Gate a pool, in Aramaic called Bethesda, which has five roofed colonnades. <sup>3</sup>In these lay a multitude of invalids—blind, lame, and paralyzed.

- ... "a great multitude of the sick"; describes us and the Church
- Be encouraged! You're in a room full of people who don't have it all together
- Some say this is the church's weakness
- It's our strength as it allows us to come to Christ in sincerity and humility
- Verse 4 is probably not in the earliest manuscripts but tells of the legends that brought people there
- Day after day, a hopeless hope

#### John 5:5-7 (English Standard Version)

<sup>5</sup>One man was there who had been an invalid for thirty-eight years. <sup>6</sup>When Jesus saw him lying there and knew that he had already been there a long time, He said to him, "Do you want to be healed?" 7The sick man answered Him, "Sir, I have no one to put me into the pool when the water is stirred up, and while I am going another steps down before me."

- 38 years of pain, disappointment, false hope Why?
- We often repeat patterns without checking if they are valid or if they lead to faith and health
- Jesus saw him and He still sees!
- He is not oblivious to our pain
- He went to this gate on purpose
- He went to find this man
- Christ is drawn to need and broken sinners

- At first glance, Jesus' question is almost silly...
- But sickness and begging and reliance on others is all the man has known for 38 years
- We'd rather stay where we are and complain
- We prefer anger, want sympathy or attention, playing the martyr
- Are you holding on to anger, bitterness, regret, guilt, a destructive habit?
- Change is often scarier than our problems

- The man is alone, struggling and hopeless
- Sounds like us in our pain

#### John 5:8-9 (English Standard Version)

<sup>8</sup>Jesus said to him, "Get up, take up your bed, and walk." <sup>9</sup> And at once the man was healed, and he took up his bed and walked.

- Is there healing today? Absolutely!
- Some are healed; Christ left multitudes sick
- To the sick: Believe not that God will or must heal. Believe in a great God that can heal and save your soul and bring purpose to life beyond physical health.
- Jesus acted mercifully to this man's suffering
- Jesus saw and spoke and did do you?
- "Immediately"- Christ is powerful

#### John 5:9-10 (English Standard Version)

9 And at once the man was healed, and he took up his bed and walked.

Now that day was the Sabbath. <sup>10</sup>So the Jews said to the man who had been healed, "It is the Sabbath, and it is not lawful for you to take up your bed."

- Jewish law prohibited A LOT
- Legalism forces us to live in fear; not celebration
- Christianity is all about a relationship with a personal, powerful Jesus not extra rules
- These men were paralyzed by their religion/self-righteousness

- The healing wasn't just for this man
- It was to confront empty religion and expose sin and heart paralysis in others, too
- That's true for you and your pain and blessings too!

#### John 5:11-16 (English Standard Version)

<sup>11</sup>But he answered them, "The man who healed me, that man said to me, 'Take up your bed, and walk." 12They asked him, "Who is the man who said to you, 'Take up your bed and walk'?" 13Now the man who had been healed did not know who it was, for Jesus had withdrawn, as there was a crowd in the place. 14Afterward Jesus found him in the temple and said to him, "See, you are well! Sin no more, that nothing worse may happen to you." 15The man went away and told the Jews that it was Jesus who had healed him. 16 And this was why the Jews were persecuting Jesus, because He was doing these things on the Sabbath.

- V 14- if you ignore this, if you idolize this, if you embrace sin, if you ignore the Gospel worse will happen
- Sickness/death and hell

#### John 5:17 (English Standard Version)

<sup>17</sup>But Jesus answered them, "My Father is working until now, and I am working."

- Jesus seems to be picking a fight, doesn't He?
- He's confronting them at their weakest point; confronts their sin
- Bring us to Himself through our desperation and exposed sin
- Where would Christ confront you?

- Will you love humanity the way Christ did?
- Are you accepting God's grace gifts yet embracing sin, ignoring His deeper works for salvation and holiness?
- Do you want to get well?
- What sin would Christ confront in you?


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
